# **Henry the Healer**

A three-legged cat and his friends change the way people view life's circumstances.

#### HENRY THE CAT HELPS PEOPLE HEAL.

This once-feral three-legged cat - and recipient of the ASCPA's 2010 Cat of the Year honor - welcomes people into his world, Henry's World, a place where human "paw-pals" across the country learn how to turn obstacles into opportunities.

Through his e-mail correspondence, his website and his growing library of books and workbooks, Henry's innocent and trustworthy voice allows him to connect with individuals of all ages, something his guardian and official spokesperson Cathy Conheim envisions as a national healing project.

"We want people to learn that it's not the events of your life that will dictate what happens to you, it's your response to those events," Conheim says, quoting one of Henry's "Kibbles for Thought," which are sprinkled throughout the cat's books.

"Animals are our trusted teachers about our hearts and spirits, so we're using the animals to try and focus the attention on what really matters," she says.



#### **A Surprise Gift**

Henry's story begins in 2004, in the small mountain town of Julian, Calif., where a litter of feral cats came to

Conheim's land to live. One day, a child who lives on the land told Conheim that one of the kitties had a hurt paw. A lifelong dog-only person, Conheim found the injured animal and took him to the country veterinarian, who told her, for the cat to survive, his leg would need to be amputated. Euthanasia or amputation were the choices.

The tabby, unabated by his new circumstance, found a home with Conheim, her friend, Donna Brooks, and a resident Poodle named Dolly. He even found a girlfriend - a two-legged Dachshund named Tink. Somewhat unwelcome by the dogfriendly household, the cat's tenacity and

> courage quickly won over the family and all of their dog-only friends.

> So began a journey that has since inspired thousands across the country.

"It moved from this accidental event, where the cat landed in the lap of people who didn't even like cats, to a national healing project," Conheim says.

> Conheim, a retired psychotherapist, wanted to share Henry's inspirational tale, so she started composing and e-mailing his lessonfilled stories to friends and family, who then forwarded them to others. Soon, Henry's tales circled the cyberspace globe, touching recipients'

lives everywhere - from soldiers in our two wars to young children in hospitals in Haiti.

At the same time, e-mails to Henry started pouring in. People wrote to the cat daily, sharing secrets and expressing deep-rooted emotions. On the other end, Conheim responded with the wise cat's innocent voice, helping Henry's pawpals transform trials into opportunities for growth.

To date, Conheim has responded to more than 50,000 messages.

"Henry is their touchstone for hope and trust and resilience and self-esteem, which amazes me," Conheim says. "He's just an outdoor feral country cat who landed in the home of people who hated cats. So he belongs to nobody; he belongs to the world."

#### A New Vocabulary

When Conheim realized the power behind Henry's message - of responding in a positive way to life's challenges - she developed a website, HenrysWorld.org, and a series of books and workbooks that encourage



"He's become the country's thera-pet,"
Conheim says. "I would never have guessed
that a virtual pet could become so endeared
to literally millions of people who have read
about him."

humans to think of themselves beyond their circumstances, Conheim says.

"Animals don't ever look backward to what they had; only humans do that," she says. "Animals wake up one day and figure out how to do life with what they have. They're great teachers."

The self-published books, including Henry's World, What's the Matter with Henry and Dolly's book What's the Matter with Me? I'm Here, Too, help readers develop a new vocabulary for healing, Conheim says. The materials have been distributed to schools and hospitals nationwide to help people overcome stigma and see themselves as more than their disabilities.

Conheim recalls one touching letter.

"One gal from Maryland wrote, 'Henry, if you want to know why your life was saved, he's 8 years old and his name is Jose. As he was on his way to have his leg amputated, he held onto your book because he wants to have the heart of a lion like you."

Eight weeks later, Conheim says, the little boy drew a picture for Henry, illustrating his new prosthetic. He asked Henry why he didn't have a prosthetic, too. "Henry wrote back, 'I had an extra leg. I had four and I didn't need four. I can do fine on three," Conheim says. "So there ensues correspondence."

That correspondence helped give the young boy courage and confidence. It helped him heal, Conheim says.
